Vaccine updates—"Last Mile" Vaccination Program: Last Mile is the vendor to provide mobile vaccination support, and this resource is prioritized for the 20 municipalities and priority populations such as BIPOC, non-English speaking, individuals with access and functional needs, amongst other vulnerable populations. An email was sent out recently (to the Fire Chiefs) but provided misleading information about the availability of this resource. It is not available for everyone, but we are working on collaborating with additional entities to provide these services widespread. Also, looking at municipalities to transfer vaccine supply to mobile clinics because no additional vaccine available from DPH.

Vaccine updates—Federal vaccine allocations: Federal strategy currently prioritizes vaccine to retail pharmacy chains and Federally Qualified Health Centers (FQHCs). Over the past few weeks the Federal government has announced significant investment in FQHCs—both in terms of capacity building and vaccines. There are 27 FQHCs in MA, and they are able to order more than 7k doses / week. Many are not currently ordering their full allotment, some of them haven't ordered them at all. Please reach out to your local FQHCs to see if there are opportunities to strengthen partnerships and/or support that you can provide to increase the amount of vaccine they are ordering directly from the Federal government. This is one way that you can help increase the vaccine coming into your community.

Biden Administration has made a commitment to increase vaccine to meet an objective of a vaccine site within 5 miles of 90% of all Americans by April 19th. Part of the "90/90" initiative. The Administration will increase the current number of pharmacies giving out vaccines from 17k to nearly 40k within the next three weeks. In MA, the number of CVS pharmacies and additional retail pharmacy chains will continue to increase. Retail pharmacy



partnership with Federal government does not go through Massachusetts at all. Doses for retail pharmacies come in addition to the allocation that comes to the state.

Administration is also adding 12 more federally-run mass vaccination sites. At sites currently stood up, over 60% of the shots going to minority communities. This includes the FEMA effort at the Hynes Convention Center in Boston.

The state's allocation is currently flat, meaning we are not seeing an increase in doses allocated to the state at this time. If/when the federal government increases the state's allocation, we will allocate vaccine, including to the regional collaboratives that have been approved but have not yet commenced operations due to lack of supply.



Only items in gold are what comes through Massachusetts. Smaller percentage coming into Massachusetts from the total. Huge bump in dark blue on March 28th refers to allotment to CVS and Walgreens from Federal government.

Q: How does the state supply differentiate from the federal supply?

A: Forecasted view, usually around 3 weeks—we are not seeing an increase of doses allocated for the state at this time.

Homebound vaccinations: As of March 30th, 4,571 total incoming calls to MassOptions, and 954 outbound calls. 1,696 residents determined eligible over last 5 days. Average speed to answer



has been less than 3 min. ~20% of callers live in a municipality running their own homebound program and referred to their LBOH. ~80% live in a municipality using the State Homebound Program. Of the 80%, ~2/3 are screened as eligible for homebound vaccination and the remaining are referred to 2-1-1 for other questions etc. Data on number of incoming calls to LBOH not available to DPH right now.

After being confirmed eligible, individuals are called back within ~3 days to schedule appointment. 230 appointments scheduled so far, ~1,500 individuals yet to be scheduled. 62% call success rate; 20% of identified eligible residents scheduled for appointments (will ramp up). CCA vaccinated 25 individuals on Friday and 25 more on Monday.

Running totals slides: These are people that have called us so far, not the percentage of eligible persons by county yet.

For those wanting to do option 1 (LBOH hosting vaccination clinics), follow up survey was released last week. DPH following up on requests and trying to find the most efficient and useful allocation plan. Only allocation for people who have actually been screened because there is so much movement between estimates and final numbers. Working on allocating J&J, hoping to be delivered early next week so you can get your programs started. For communities who chose to use the state program (option 2), please refer individuals to 1-833-983-0485. Do not use this number for screening. Screening should be done locally.

Q: How are the doses allocated to the community? In lots of 100?

A: Really important to fill out the survey for communities who chose Option 1. J&J ships vaccine from manufacturer in 100 doses, 5 vials of 20 doses each. If a community only has a



number of 10 people to vaccinate, we are looking for ways to share remaining doses. If you do have leftover doses, please work with the Council on Aging or ASAPs in your community to identify other people who might not qualify as homebound, but are elderly/might have trouble traveling to a vaccination site. Also, people with a history of allergies to vaccines need special consideration with the homebound program.

Q: Am I enrolled in the homebound program?

A: If you did not fill out the survey about having to sign up for either option 1 or 2, DPH chose option 2 for you to ensure coverage.

CMG Associates: Services offered include individual support, training (online webinars), and leadership coaching. 23 webinars hosted so far, about 300 people attended. Questions from Q&A answered out loud:

Q: Any guidance for prom and commencement?

A: <u>Graduation/commencement guidance has been posted</u>. Working to finish prom guidance to release this week.

Q: Guidance on farmer's markets?

A: Department of Agricultural Resources, who released farmer's market guidance last year, is working on a revision now and this will be released shortly.

Q: Guidance for lawn games?

A: Follow arcade and recreation standards. Also, social distance and wear a mask.

Q: Any information about number of teachers/educators vaccinated so far? How did they go?

A: Will look back on this. We heard anecdotally that it went well.

Q: Local rate of transmission within households increased, did variants have a role in this?

A: We have heard of this as an observation from a few LBOHs. Possible it could be from a variant of concern. B.1.1.7 is widespread, whereas P.1 is more focal (Essex, Middlesex, and Barnstable counties). Increase in cases we are seeing likely associated with increase in variants. Unlikely to be just due to the variants. We are reopening, and people are really tired of wearing



masks and social distancing. Looking at a confluence of events that might contribute to this uptick in cases.

Q: Is Massachusetts still only able to sequence about 1% of the tests?

A: We used to be 0.5%, not great but it's doubled. This is something the country has struggled with nationally, enrolling more national laboratories to do more sequencing. Data right now not enough to inform policy.
